Singing: God wants us to praise Him via music


"When the Morning Stars sang together ..." Job 38:7

I found it interesting that we read that the morning stars "SANG" at the creation of the earth according to the book of Job. Both the KJV and the NKJV seem to hint that Satan was also involved with music in heaven. Did he lead the heavenly choir (the stars) in singing worship to God? Was Satan the head musician? Maybe.

There are really very few verses that I can find that back this up, but the scriptures do say he was the "anointed cherub" in Ezekiel 28:14. Considering the fact that the angels constantly worship God (Isaiah 6:3; Revelation 4:8), it is possible that Satan led the angels constantly in that worship. Likely he was the highest of all angels, after all he was persuasive enough to convince one-third of the angels to join him in rebellion.

I began a search to see how many times the Bible records the angels singing. It surprised me that I didn't find them singing in Heaven again until I got to the book of Revelation.

However, I did come across David and the Psalms. David was called "a man after God's own heart." David was a singer. The Psalms are to be sung and to be sung to music. David

However, see David "SINGING" his repentance in the Psalms. God must have been pleased because he forgave David, although David did have to pay a penalty for his actions.

Something else I noticed about David. He was definitely onto something when he said a certain Psalm was to be sung with a certain instrument to a certain beat. Just think of it, if "Just As I Am" was sung to BeBop instead — the whole feeling would be lost. You just have to hear the first four words and you FEEL the song. The same with that new Christian song "I Can Only Imagine" — those first bars of music set the tone for that song — any other application and it loses something. I could go on and on — "O, Holy Night" etc., but I'm sure you get the picture.

Think about it. If Satan was the heavenly choir leader and when he fell he took that choir with him, then was there SINGING in heaven after that or just here on earth? Do the angels sing?

Thus began my thinking and reasoning. We find all through the scriptures the Israelites singing. They even had the choir go before them as they were entering into the battle to destroy Jericho. They constantly sang. And even in today's Israel the Passover has six or seven songs they sing. It is called the Hallel (which means Praise) taken from Psalms 113–118.

Interesting, I always thought the angels sang at the birth of Christ, but it says they "SAID." Even the four living creatures at the throne of God "SAID", "Holy, Holy, Holy". Jesus and the apostles sang after the Lord's Supper. We get to the "church era" and we have Paul and Silas singing when they were in jail. I began to

notice the difference between "singing" and "saying." Put your hand on your diaphragm and "SAY" — Hallelujah; no movement, right? Now put your hand on your diaphragm and "SING" — Hallelujah; quite a difference. Your whole inner being is involved. And the scripture tells us that not only is our spirit within us but the Holy Spirit lives in us also.

Could it be we are heaven's choir now? How pleased God must be when we "SING" his praises. When the Jewish people sang and shouted the walls came down. As Paul and Silas sang the chains fell off and they were set free. As our worship leaders and choirs lead us we should be so excited — God is listening and approving our worship. It doesn't matter if we can't carry a tune. Sing anyway — don't just sing in your heart — open your mouth and let God be praised. These praise songs are setting us free and loosening the bonds that have us bound. We are FREE — free to worship and praise our God for who He is and what He

When we get to heaven, we will definitely be singing. So let go and sing your praises now with the knowledge that God is listening and loving hearing you sing.
